I appreciate everyone in our community and province who believes in BBBS and has kept our youth strong even during these most trying times.



# OUR RESULTS



## Our 2019-2020 Results & Outcomes

BBBS across Saskatchewan is actively working to increase and unify our outcome measurements around Social Emotional Competence, Mental Health & Wellbeing, and Educational Engagement. Our strengthened outcome measurements have been developed, are being implemented into our programming, and will be ready to launch for 2020-2021 data. We currently track strong outcome data through In-School Mentoring. However, the abrupt end to the 2019-2020 school year due to COVID-19 has limited our ability to track meaningful data.

# VIRTUAL MENTORING



## Mentoring in a World of Social Isolation

2020 has undoubtedly been a challenging year for the best of us. More than ever, vulnerable children and families are facing increased anxiety, stress, fear, and worry. The children we serve are likely to bear the heaviest burdens of trauma and economic fallout. Because of this, it has been extremely important for Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) to provide innovative means of support for families, children, and mentors due to COVID-19.

Imagine being a child during this pandemic. You find out, with little notice, that your school is closing during the middle of the year. All of the extra spare time sounds great until you realize that you have to isolate yourself and cannot see your friends. Your school year continues, but it's happening through an unusual virtual setting. If you have siblings, but only one family computer, then you're all competing to access schooling and socialize with friends online. When you do get access to your computer, you're thriving as much as possible. But when you don't have access, you think about going outside to play. Then you realize that all of the stores are closed, none of the parks are open, and no entertainment is happening.

On top of this, your parents may be laid off from their job, working reduced hours, or feeling uncertainty for their own futures. Now imagine being in a single parent household where money was already scarce. When supportive adults are struggling with their mental wellbeing, they're also finding it challenging to give children the support they need. There's no scheduled day for when you'll see your friends again, go to school, socialize in person, and properly develop throughout your crucial childhood years. Imagine the impact this has on a child's social, mental, and educational development.

This was the reality of our community's children due to COVID-19. This is also the reason why mentoring is even more crucial to a child's success due to the pandemic. We acknowledged these new adversities and responded swiftly to offer Virtual Mentoring to our youth. In-person interactions have always been the core of a developmental mentoring relationship, but we gladly accepted the challenge to support children in the absence of in-person mentoring.

We worked closely with BBBS of Peel to develop new training, support materials, and virtual activities for mentors and children to participate in online. We further collaborated with all BBBS agencies in Saskatchewan to offer online support meetings for mentors. Here they would gather virtually with BBBS staff to ask questions, brainstorm mentoring ideas, and explore stronger ways to empower children who need additional support more than ever. We adapted our mentor recruitment practices to create Virtual Mentoring matches that would become in-person relationships later. We even secured donations from community members that equipped every child in BBBS with a piece of technology to keep them connected to social activities, friends, and education during times of social distancing. It is still too early to record the outcomes, but we are confident that children are socially stimulated, mentally resilient, and educationally engaged because of mentoring through BBBS.




# **EMILY AND SYRAIJA**



# FINANCIALS AT A GLANCE



#### What it means:

Grants and Government funding saw a slight increase due to emergency funding related to COVID-19. Fundraising revenue for 2019-2020 had a minimum impact, but 2020-2021 is expected to have a higher percentage of grants and a lower percentage of fundraising. Marketing and recruitment was low as we used word of mouth advertising effectively. Recruitment efforts for Spring and Summer were limited due to COVID-19 restrictions.
